Inclusion Strategies for Early Language Learners; Supporting Preschoolers with Autism Spectrum Disorder, other learning needs and children from multi-lingual families

Date: Tuesday April 1 6:30-9pm & Saturday April 5 9-12:30 pm **Cost:** \$75 **Total PD hours:** 6 hours **Location: ONLINE Presenters:** Heather Bartholomew & Debbie Thompson

Description: This two-part session will guide participants through an introduction to how language delays can present in different children, how to use information from observations to make adaptations to help engage & motivate children, particularly those who may not be motivated by the same materials as peers or who resist participating in various routines. We will examine our own attitudes toward inclusion & how those attitudes influence the culture of the entire classroom. Participants will be guided through various concrete teaching strategies to build communication skills in preschoolers with limited language skills, to reduce undesired behaviours & to facilitate interaction & relationship development with peers. Participants will also be guided through discussion of how we can engage with families when there are language & cultural barriers.

Three learning outcomes

1) to acquire strategies for discovering motivators to engage children with ASD & other learning needs

2) to practice using children's interests to adapt materials & routines to build communication, play & social skills

3) to gain experience developing plans for reducing disruptive behaviours

Presenter Biographies: *Heather Bartholomew* graduated with a Bachelor of Applied Arts (Child & Youth Study) & in the twenty plus years since then, has been working with preschoolers. Additionally, she has recently begun working part-time with adults with developmental delays, giving her a broader, across the lifespan perspective on supporting diverse individuals at any age. She has worked as an Early Childhood Educator, one-to-one support staff & as a resource teacher. For five years, she served as Resource Teacher at the Mount's Child Study Centre, supporting children with identified special needs &, in particular, delivering programming to students with Autism Spectrum Disorder. Heather has worked as a Program Implementer in Halifax's Early Intensive Behavioural Intervention program for the past seventeen years. She has developed & facilitated workshops on a variety of topics, most frequently relating to Inclusion. Heather is passionate about facilitating positive inclusion experiences & finding effective & efficient strategies to support individual & classroom-wide learning.

Debbie Thompson is a graduate from Mount Saint Vincent University with the Degree in Child & Youth. Debbie started her journey in ECE at Wee Care Developmental centre working as a Developmental teacher in an integrated setting. It was there that she knew she wanted to focus her attention on working with children with special needs. Debbie also developed the Resource position at Wee Care & was responsible for developing & implementing plans for children with special needs. Debbie now works at the IWK as a Program Implementer for the Early Intensive Behaviour Intervention program (EIBI) working with children with Autism. Through her job at the IWK she continues to work closely with preschool teachers consulting & providing feedback in various programs. Debbie also teaches regularly at Nova Scotia College of Early Childhood Education & Mount Saint Vincent University on various topics including challenging behaviour & Inclusion.

Description: Overtime family dynamics have seen a shift in Canada & across the world. There is a requirement for ECEs to expand their early learning practices to support more equitable learning spaces for diverse families. In this workshop, ECEs will explore what family is & gain insight into how to support children from diverse family structures, such as co-parenting, blended families, & intergenerational households. Educators will look at how they can update their language & materials they use in their program to support children's lived experiences. Using reflective exercises such as eco-mapping, educators will explore on their own family & support networks. Objectives:

1) Define what a family is by exploring shifts family dynamics & diverse family structures.

2) Learn tools to support relationships with families & adapt learning spaces to reflect children's home life & experiences.

3) Take part in engaging reflective exercises to deepen our understanding of what family is in the modern world.


Description: This hands-on workshop explores how to design purposeful provocations & invitations to play in early learning environments. Facilitated by two experienced educators, participants will learn how to set up & implement three main types of provocations: table-top provocations, small world setups, & book-inspired invitations to play. The session emphasizes the use of loose parts, creative material-making, & intentional design to foster children's curiosity, creativity, & exploration. Participants will have the unique opportunity to practice these skills in real time within a child care setting. This workshop is ideal for educators looking to deepen their understanding of the role provocations play in fostering rich, play-based learning experiences.

Attendees will be able to articulate strategies to help children build emotional self-awareness & resilience through supportive language & meaningful interactions.

Trauma-Informed and Culturally Responsive Practices for Early Childhood Educators

Date: Saturday May 10, 2025 9am-12pm & Monday May 12, 2025 6pm-9pm Cost: \$75 Total PD hours: 6 hrs Location: ONLINE Presenters: Karen Carey & Colin Morrison

Description: This session addresses the evolving challenges Early Childhood Educators (ECEs) face when supporting children & families impacted by trauma. Through interactive discussions, real-world scenarios, & reflective exercises, participants will enhance their skills in creating inclusive, responsive environments for all children & families. During the workshop, facilitators will address the unique challenges of working with children & families from multicultural backgrounds, including those for whom English is a second language. Insights into how cultural values, traditions, & experiences shape responses to trauma & resilience, & strategies to support ECEs who may encounter unique professional challenges tied to their personal experiences & perspectives. By the end of this session, participants will be able to (objectives):

Understand Trauma-Informed Care: Identify & apply the key principles of trauma-informed care in early childhood education settings.

Recognize Multicultural Challenges: Analyze the unique challenges faced by children & families from multicultural backgrounds, including those for whom English is a second language, in the context of trauma.

Explore Cultural Influences on Trauma & Resilience: Gain insights into how cultural values, traditions, & lived experiences influence responses to trauma & the development of resilience.

Support Diverse ECEs: Develop strategies to support ECEs from diverse cultural backgrounds who may face unique professional & personal challenges.

Foster Inclusive Environments: Enhance skills in creating trauma-informed, inclusive, & culturally responsive environments for all children & families.

Engage in Collaborative Learning: Participate in interactive discussions, real-world scenarios, & reflective exercises to apply learned concepts to practical settings.

This workshop aims to equip ECEs with updated knowledge & tools to navigate the evolving complexities of their roles with confidence & cultural sensitivity.

Presenter Biographies: *Colin Morrison* has over 20 years' experience working with children, youth & families in the mental health field. Colin has served primarily as youth care worker & case coordinator for families & children in the Child & Family Day Treatment Program at the IWK. He has extensive experience in developing & implementing skill groups with children, particularly in the area of emotional regulation, & providing supportive counselling to families. Colin is currently completing a Master of Social Worker degree at Dalhousie University, & is working on a thesis related to male childhood sexual abuse, & the impacts of "toxic masculinity" on mens' help seeking behaviours. He has a keen interest in trauma focused therapy, attachment theory, mens' health, & issues affecting the LGBTQ+ community.

Karen Carey has over 15 years' experience working with children, youth & families as a social worker, youth care worker, case coordinator, in home support worker & direct care practitioner. Through evidence based & best practice methods, Karen is a strong advocate for the children, youth & families. Although Karen has strong roots in attachment theory, systems theory, positive parenting, trauma & resilience; her personal philosophy is to promote mental, physical & emotional health/wellbeing though a solution focused & social learning model.

Together Colin & Karen have seen positive & long lasting benefits for children AND families when they are provided education, strategies, guidance, empathy & support. They see effective communication & open collaboration as the key ingredients in supporting positive futures for the children & families under their care.

Understanding Tantrums and Dysregulation: Supporting Emotional Regulation in Young Children AND Building Emotional Intelligence: Validating Feelings and Fostering Resilience in Early Childhood

Dates: Tuesday May 13 AND Thursday May 15, 2025 6:30-8:30 pm each night **ONLINE Cost:** \$50 **Total PD hours:** 4 hrs **Location: ONLINE Presenter:** Jessica Morine

Description: Part 1: This two part series will equip early childhood educators with the knowledge & strategies needed to support children's emotional regulation & foster the development of emotional intelligence. These skills are essential for children's social-emotional growth, resilience, & long-term success. By understanding the neurobiology of emotions & learning techniques for validating children's feelings, participants will be better prepared to create emotionally supportive environments in their classrooms.

What happens in a child's brain during a tantrum? How can caregivers & educators effectively support children through periods of dysregulation? This workshop introduces information from Dr. Dan Siegel to help participants understand the neurobiology behind emotional dysregulation in young children. Through interactive discussions, participants will learn practical strategies for connecting with, calming & supporting children during challenging moments. Key techniques include co-regulation, tone-matching, & maintaining boundaries while creating a safe & supportive environment. This session equips early childhood professionals with evidence-based tools to help children navigate big emotions & develop foundational regulation skills.

1. Objectives: Attendees will be able to describe the processes occurring in children during tantrums.

2. Attendees will be able to demonstrate effective techniques for supporting children during dysregulated states, including co-regulation & non-verbal communication.

Attendees will be able to articulate how to balance emotional support with maintaining boundaries & expectations.

Part 2: Emotional intelligence (EQ) is the ability to recognize, understand, & manage emotions—skills that are critical for social, emotional, & cognitive success. This workshop focuses on how caregivers & educators can validate children's emotions, helping them build emotional intelligence & resilience. Participants will learn how to use effective language to acknowledge children's feelings, avoid invalidation, & promote emotional self-awareness. Techniques such as replacing "buts" with "ands," using the three-because formula, & offering space for children to fully experience their emotions will be explored. This session empowers professionals to nurture emotionally intelligent children who are confident, empathetic, & equipped to manage life's challenges.

Objectives: Attendees will be able to define emotional intelligence & explain its importance in early childhood development. Attendees will be able to demonstrate techniques for validating children's emotions without minimizing or dismissing them. Attendees will be able to articulate strategies to help children build emotional self-awareness & resilience through supportive language & meaningful interactions.

Presenter Biography: *Jessica Morine* has been dedicated to supporting children & families since earning her Early Childhood Education (ECE) diploma in 2006. Jessica holds an ECE Administrator Continuing Education certificate from Mount Saint Vincent University & a Parent Coaching Certificate from the Parent Coaching Institute. As a parent to two adventurous children, aged 11 & 5, Jessica brings both professional expertise & personal insight into her work. Then when you know better do better.*' & take a deep dive into what legacy do we want to leave for the future generations. Let's dream about how we want early childhood learning to really feel & look like.

Strategies for Supporting Risk Taking in Early Learning Environments

Date Thursday May 29, 2025 (6pm –9 pm) Cost: \$40 Total PD hours: 3 PD hours Location: ONLINE Presenter: Robyn Corbett

Description: Young children learn through taking risks & challenging themselves, developing confidence & strong selfidentities. Increasingly there has been a trend away from types of risky play, especially in early learning spaces, due to concerns of safety & liability. As ECEs we must explore our role in creating learning spaces that challenge children & encourage risk taking, supporting their learning & lifelong well-being. There is also a requirement to create partnerships with parents, administrators, & licensing to validate concerns, while continuing to respond to the risk-taking needs of children. In this workshop, we will look closer at what risky play is & how it can be achieved. We will reflect on our own experiences with risk taking, developing an understanding how it played a role in our learning & resiliency building. We will look at risk assessment strategies, learning how to analyze in an ongoing way in order to meet the goals of risk & safety. Educators will also develop language for working with risky play skeptics. Objectives

- 1) Define what is risky play & how it fits into early learning spaces.
- 2) Learn how to support & analyze risk, while maintaining safety goals.
- 3) Develop language for working with skeptical stakeholders.
- 4) Reflect on personal experiences with risk in childhood.

Facilitator Biography: *Robyn Corbett* has a Bachelor of Arts (Child & Youth) from MSVU & has been working in early learning settings for a decade. As a certified yoga & mindfulness instructor, Robyn has encouraged young people to deepen their relationships with themselves, others, & their environment through engaging mindfulness programming. She currently is a lead pre-primary teacher in Halifax, NS. Her early learning practice is deeply influenced by contemplative practices, inspiring her to stay curious about her assumptions in order to continue her growth as an educator.

Robyn is passionate about offering professional development workshops for ECEs looking to expand their understanding of concepts related to children's well-being & learning. Combining evidence-based content with reflective exercises, Robyn invites educators to deepen their early learning practice in a fun & engaging style.

Conflict Resolution with Caregivers

Date: Saturday, June 7 9am-12 noon & Monday June 9 6pm-9pm.

Description: Dealing with difficult people & having challenging conversations is something most people will encounter. As Early Child Care Workers, you face various challenging conversations regularly, which can lead to additional stressors both professionally & personally. These situations can become even more complex when working with peers or families who are new to Canada, speak English as a second language, or come from culturally diverse backgrounds with differing beliefs or practices. To effectively navigate these challenges, it is essential to have strong conflict resolution skills & strategies to manage such conversations constructively. The purpose of this two-part workshop series is to support staff in preparing for high-stakes conversations with parents & colleagues, addressing concerns early & consistently before they escalate into significant issues. The workshop will also explore the role of workplace dynamics, highlight the importance of self-care, & include discussions on the unique communication barriers that can arise when working with individuals from diverse cultural & linguistic backgrounds. By the end of this session, participants will be able to (objectives):

1. **Develop Conflict Resolution Skills:** Equip participants with practical tools & techniques to effectively manage & resolve conflicts in professional settings.

2. Enhance Communication Strategies: Learn strategies to navigate challenging conversations with parents & colleagues, focusing on clear, respectful, & solution-oriented communication, including approaches for bridging language & cultural differences.

3. Address Workplace Dynamics: Explore the impact of workplace dynamics on relationships & interactions, with a focus on building positive, collaborative environments.

4. **Proactively Manage Issues:** Identify methods for addressing concerns early & consistently, preventing minor issues from escalating into significant conflicts.

5. **Practice Self-Care:** Recognize the importance of self-care & stress management techniques to maintain personal & professional well-being.

Prepare for High-Stake Conversations: Build confidence in preparing for & engaging in high-stakes conversations, ensuring concerns are addressed constructively.

This two-part workshop is designed to empower Early Child Care Workers with the skills & strategies needed to navigate difficult situations with resilience & professionalism, while addressing the unique challenges posed by cultural diversity & communication barriers.

Presenter Biographies: *Colin Morrison* has over 20 years' experience working with children, youth & families in the mental health field. Colin has served primarily as youth care worker & case coordinator for families & children in the Child & Family Day Treatment Program at the IWK. He has extensive experience in developing & implementing skill groups with children, particularly in the area of emotional regulation, & providing supportive counselling to families. Colin is currently completing a Master of Social Worker degree at Dalhousie University, & is working on a thesis related to male childhood sexual abuse, & the impacts of "toxic masculinity" on mens' help seeking behaviours. He has a keen interest in trauma focused therapy, attachment theory, mens' health, & issues affecting the LGBTQ+ community. *Karen Carey* has over 15 years' experience working with children, youth & families as a social worker, youth care worker,


